What is Recycle Coach?



- Online platform for residents (App or Desktop)
- Provides collection schedules, material specific information, collection day/special events reminders, reporting tools, education tools, and much more
- No personal information needed
- Optional reminders and push notifications by zone
- Provides full tech support and marketing support to help promote the platform for your sucess





Recycle Coach in NJ

A free recycling education tool for NJ residents

- Purchased by NJDEP in late 2017
 - 3-year contract plus option for extensions
- Free to use for all NJ Counties and Municipalities
- Education with the goal of contamination reduction
- Accessible through a free app (Android and Apple) or desktop computer
- Individual admin pages
 - Insights on resident behavior
 - Admin Portal access for data, reports and peer reviews
- Municipal metrics and county metrics
- Opportunity for direct resident communication
- Customizable
- English and Spanish





Demographic Coverage

- NJ is the first State to purchase statewide
- 19 of our 21 Counties are fully active
- 262 out of 565 Municipalities are fully active
- Represents 62% of NJ population





First Steps

- Promote!
 - Let everyone know there is a new free recycling tool available
 - Email blasts
 - Letter to Mayors
- Data gathering
 - RC took point
- Becoming fully active
 - Counties and Municipalities work directly with RC
 - Simple step by step instructions
 - RC provides everything needed to post on website



Here are some popular websites that encourage users to buy, sell or swap reusable goods:

BookMooch is a free online exchange community where users can give away and get books via points.

How It Works: Users receive a point for every book they give away, which they can use to get any book listed on BookMooch. Users have the option of keeping the new books in their collection or re-listing it to give to another user when they are done with it.

The Freecycle Network is made up of more than 5,000 groups with more than 7.6 million members across the globe. Rather than congesting landfills with reusable goods, Freecycle enables users to give and get these items for free. Each group is organized and managed locally by volunteers.

How It Works: To give away any goods or see what is available, find a group near you and sign up to be a member. Membership is free and everything posted must be free, legal and appropriate for all ages.

North Gateway MRF Upgrade Investment

- December 12, 2018- Council Approved Closed Loop Interest Free Loan of \$3M
- January 9, 2019- Council approved \$1M investment from the City of Peoria
- September 21, 2019- NGTS MRF upgrade started
- December 21, 2019- MRF upgrade completed

- City of Phoenix \$500,000












Aluminum 52% Increase
