# RECONSIDERATION OF FINAL NEW SOURCE PERFORMANCE STANDARDS AND EMISSION GUIDELINES FOR COMMERCIAL AND INDUSTRIAL SOLID WASTE INCINERATION UNITS

### **ACTION**

- On December 1, 2014, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) issued a proposal announcing reconsideration of, and requesting public comment on, specific issues in the agency's 2013 final amendments to its standards limiting air pollutant emissions from commercial and industrial solid waste incineration (CISWI) units. EPA is also proposing a limited number of amendments to the final rule.
- EPA is seeking public comment on four issues the agency has agreed to reconsider. The four issues are:
  - the definition of continuous emissions monitoring system (CEMS) data usage during startup and shutdown periods;
  - o the reduced particulate matter (PM) limit for the waste-burning kilns subcategory;
  - establishing a fuel variability factor for the coal-burning energy recovery units subcategory; and
  - o revising the definition of kiln to clarify the boundaries of the waste-burning kiln and to remain consistent with similar revisions made in the Portland Cement NESHAP.
- EPA is proposing several clarifying changes and corrections to the final rule and is soliciting comment only on whether the proposed changes provide the intended accuracy, clarity and consistency.
- EPA is proposing to remove the affirmative defense provisions from the final rule in light of the recent Court decision vacating the affirmative defense provisions in the Clean Air Act section 112 rule establishing emission standards for Portland cement kilns.
- This proposed action does not impose any new requirements or costs, or change the compliance deadlines. Existing CISWI units will need to comply with the CISWI rule no later than three years after EPA approves a state plan or five years after promulgation of the February 7, 2013 final amendments, whichever is earlier.
- EPA will accept public comment for 45 days after the proposal is published in the Federal Register.

## **BACKGROUND**

- A CISWI unit is any device that is used to burn solid waste at a commercial or industrial facility. Examples of CISWI units include:
  - Units designed to discard solid waste;

- o Energy recovery units (ERUs) designed to recover heat that combust solid waste; and
- Waste burning kilns that combust solid waste in the manufacture of a product.
- The CISWI rule covers four CISWI subcategories:
  - o Incinerators;
  - Energy recovery units;
  - Waste-burning kilns; and,
  - Small, remote incinerators (SRIs).
- CISWI units must either comply with the emission limits in the final rule (i.e., install add-on controls to capture emissions) or use alternative waste disposal options, such as diverting waste to a landfill.
- On March 21, 2011, EPA promulgated new source performance standards and emission guidelines for CISWI units. On February 7, 2013, EPA issued a final rule that amended the agency's 2011 standards for CISWI units.
- EPA received 7 petitions for reconsideration of the 2013 amendments. The petitions were submitted by:
  - American Forest and Paper Association, American Wood Council, National Association of Manufacturers, Biomass Power Association, Corn Refiners Association, National Oilseed Processors Association, Rubber Manufacturers Association, Southeastern Lumber Manufacturers Association, and U.S. Chamber of Commerce
  - Alaska Oil and Gas Association (AOGA), Alaska Miners Association (AMA), and Conoco Phillips Alaska, Inc.
  - o American Petroleum Institute
  - o Eastman Chemical Company
  - Portland Cement Association (PCA)
  - o Energy Recovery Council
  - Waste Management
