

A food desert is defined as an area where populations live more than one mile from a supermarket or large grocery store, if in an urban area, or more than 10 miles from a supermarket or large grocery store, if in a rural area (Ver Ploeg et al. 2012).



 Certain areas of the state are considered to be a food desert, meaning many communities do not have access to healthy, fresh foods.




Accessibility



 The theory of food deserts is that poor people eat poor diets in part because fresh, healthy food is not accessible or affordable in areas where they tend to live.






ArcGIS used to map a Food resources in Petersburg
