Funding Opportunities

Funding opportunities abound this month!

Coastal Program Small Grants

The Lake Michigan Coastal Program is accepting small grant proposals for short term projects. Categories are Education/Outreach and Planning/Coordination/Management.

Proposals due January 16th, 2018 - Maximum \$5,000 with 1:1 match

Partners for Places Grants

Partners for Places creates opportunities to improve communities by building partnerships between local government sustainability offices and place-based foundations. National funders invest in local projects to promote a healthy environment, a strong economy, and well-being of all residents.

Proposals due January 29, 2018 - Awards \$25,000 - \$150,000 with 1:1 match

CitSci Fund Citizen Science Grants

Each project will have one USFS Project Lead and one Partner Project Lead and demonstrate meaningful volunteer involvement.

Applications due January 31, 2018 - Up to \$25,000

Healthy Watersheds Consortium Grants

The Healthy Watersheds Consortium Grant Program goal is to accelerate strategic protection of healthy, freshwater ecosystems and their watersheds.

Proposals due February 1, 2018 - Awards \$50,000- \$250,000

Environmental Justice Collaborative Problem-Solving Grants

The EPA Environmental Justice Collaborative Problem-Solving Cooperative Agreement Program provides funding to support community-based organizations in their efforts to collaborate and partner with local stakeholder groups as they develop and implement solutions that address environmental and/or public health issues for underserved communities.

Proposals Due February 16, 2018 - Awards up to \$120,000

NOAA Environmental Literacy Grants

The goal of this opportunity is to support the education of K-12 students and the public, so they are knowledgeable of the ways in which their community can become more resilient to extreme weather events and/or other environmental hazards, and become involved in achieving that resilience.

Due April 6, 2018 - Awards \$250,000 - \$500,000
