- II. Student Conservation Association (SCA): A program to achieve stewardship and watershed education in Northwest Indiana *Rafael Rosa, SCA*

Before joining SCA in 2014, he spent 25 years in Museum Education in Chicago most recently at the Peggy Notebaert Nature Museum as Vice President of Education. - III. Landscape Level Wetland Functional Assessment & Prioritization: Calculating relative significance of wetlands for water quality and habitat functions in the St. Joseph River Watershed Matt Meersman, Friends of the St. Joe River Association

Matt Meersman works as a Watershed Coordinator for the Van Buren Conservation District in Paw Paw, MI and serves as President of the Friends of the St. Joe River Association. His passion for protecting the water comes from a love of being on and in it. You can find him paddling canoes and kayaks in southwest Michigan and northern Indiana several days a week all year long. Matt's presentation consisted of how the Friends of the St. Joe River Assn pursued and obtained US EPA funding for a project that prioritizes wetland function in the St. Joe River basin. Lynda Lancaster shared that the NPS Dunes Blowout- A Festival of Performance and Ecology will be held Saturday- Sunday Sept. 24 & 25 at West Beach. All are invited.

Leslie Dorworth updated the partnership that curriculum for the Master Watershed Steward Program is underway. The Master Watershed Steward Program is being designed to equip volunteers with the necessary skills to share water resource information with others in their communities; to assist with watershed conservation and restoration activities that reduce urban waterway impairments; and to engage underserved populations within the watershed.

Gina Darnell shared that NWIPA will be partnering with the SCA to modify log jams on the East Branch of the Little Calumet River during the month of September.

Drew Hart provided an update that NIRPC put in a proposal to the US Forest Service in order to fund a tree planting and maintenance crew in the municipalities of East Chicago, Whiting, Hammond, and Gary. Daniel Goldfarb indicated that Wildlife Habitat Council also put in a proposal for tree plantings on industrial properties.

Natalie Johnson and Kaitlyn McClain reminded attendees that Lake Michigan Coastal Program pre-proposals are due Sept 16.
