LWCF Outdoor Recreation Legacy Partnership Program

Grants to acquire and/or develop public lands for outdoor recreation purposes consistent with the purposes of the LWCF. Lands should be located within or serve jurisdictions delineated by the Census Bureau from the 2010 Census as "urbanized areas," and located in or directly accessible to communities that are underserved in terms of parks and recreation resources and where there are significant populations of people who are economically disadvantaged.

*Applications due September 14, 2018

Landscape Scale Restoration (LSR) competitive grants

LSR grants help State forestry agencies meet the priorities of their Forest Action Plans, while also helping the Forest Service meet regional and national needs. Organizations interested in helping States and the Forest Service attain our mutual goals can familiarize themselves with their State Forest Action Plan(s) and discuss project ideas with their State forestry agency. Coordination with State Foresters is the essential step that ensures projects will make an important, local difference.

*Partners and collaborators must submit an initial draft of their Grants.gov application to involved State Foresters by September 14, 2018.

*All State Forester Sponsor letters are due by COB October 12, 2018, which is the application deadline.

Indiana Department of Natural Resources Lake Michigan Coastal Grant

This program supports projects that seek to improve the connection between the public, communities, and the natural, cultural, and/or historical resources of Indiana's Lake Michigan watershed. Projects that help coordinate, plan or manage restoration of these resources in the coastal area are considered and must fall under one of six categories: Education & Outreach, Planning/Coordination/Management, Low Cost Construction, Land Acquisition, Applied Research, or Emerging Issues.

*Award Ceiling: \$50,000 - \$150,000 depending on category with 1:1 match

*Pre-proposals due September 14th.

HUD Choice Neighborhoods Implementation Grants

Choice Neighborhoods Implementation Grants support the implementation of comprehensive neighborhood revitalization plans that are expected to achieve

the following three core goals: 1.) Housing: Replace distressed public and assisted housing with high-quality mixed-income housing that is well-managed and responsive to the needs of the surrounding neighborhood; 2.) People: Improve outcomes of households living in the target housing related to employment and income, health, and children's education; and 3.) Neighborhood: Create the conditions necessary for public and private reinvestment in distressed neighborhoods to offer the kinds of amenities and assets, including safety, good schools, and commercial activity, that are important to families' choices about their community.

*Applications due September 17, 2018

Research to Action: Assessing and Addressing Community Exposures to Environmental Contaminants

This funding opportunity encourages applications using community-engaged research methods to investigate the potential health risks of environmental exposures of concern to the community and to implement an environmental public health action plan based on research findings.

*Applications due October 5, 2018

National Association of Realtors Smart Growth Action Grant

This grant supports a range of land-use and transportation-related activities. These activities must support Realtor engagement in land-use and/or transportation-related community issues with the primary goal of affecting public policies that support development and meets one or more of 10 Smart Growth principles.

*Applications due October 15

Conservation Alliance Public Lands Defense Fund

Grants will be awarded in support of projects that seek to secure quantifiable and permanent protection of a specific wildland or waterway. Priority will be given to landscape-scale projects that have a clear benefit for habitat. In addition, campaigns should engage grassroots citizen action in support of the effort and must have a clear recreational benefit. Before applying for funding, an organization must first be nominated by one of the alliance's member companies.

*Nominations due November 1, 2018

2019 Healthy Watersheds Consortium Grant Program RFP

The goal of the Healthy Watersheds Consortium Grant Program is to accelerate strategic protection of healthy, freshwater ecosystems and their watersheds. The primary focus for applicants should be protection and stewardship of land in the watershed, not restoration of degraded habitats or projects with a strictly water quality improvement outcome.

*Award Range \$50,000 - \$250,000
