Charge Questions

How should EPA go about addressing new reporting requirements specified in PRIA 4 for PRIA set-asides for farmworker protection activities?

- A. How should EPA evaluate appropriateness and effectiveness of farmworker protection activities?
- B. How should EPA engage stakeholders in decisions to fund such farmworker protection activities?
- C. How and when should EPA reach out to stakeholders, including farmworker community-based organizations, in their development of analyses on appropriateness and effectiveness of such activities?

Background

- ▶ PPDC Farmworker members suggested specific workgroup focusing on farmworkers and Worker Protection Standard.
- Agreement that a clinician focus should be added to the workgroup as they play a critical role in the Worker Protection Standard.

WPS Protects Two Types of Employees

- Pesticide Handlers:
 - ✓ mix, load or apply agricultural pesticides;
 - ✓ clean or repair pesticide application equipment; or
 - ✓ assist with the application of pesticides.
- Agricultural workers: those who perform tasks related to growing and harvesting plants on farms or in greenhouses, nurseries or forests.

Clinicians

- Clinicians or healthcare providers are an important component of the WPS.
 - Health center, emergency department in hospitals, urgent care, health departments
 - Specific components of WPS that involve clinicians
 - Medical evaluation for fit testing
 - ✓ Pesticide poisonings
 - Important to be trained to recognize and manage pesticide poisonings
 - EPA depends on their reports

Questions to Address

- ► PRIA-funded educational materials are not optimized for farmworker audiences. Should they be?
- ► The most recent PRIA-funded funding announcement referenced:
 - 1. Workers exposed to residue agricultural and non-agricultural
 - 2. Pesticide handlers licensed and unlicensed
 - 3. Supervisors, trainers, regulators, labor contractors, consultants

What outcomes related to PRIA-funded activities should EPA track?

Ideas include:

- ► Knowledge improvement after using educational materials
- ► Enhance the capability of partners/stakeholders to implement pesticide safety programming/activities
- Fewer incidents impacting human health and communities: fewer exposure incidents, fewer documented impacts
- Fewer incidents with environmental impact (e.g., bee kills)
- ► Educational materials created, distributed, or used
- Others?

What outcomes related to PRIA-funded activities should EPA track?

Challenges include:

- Funding to perform accurate assessment of knowledge (surveys, semi-structured interviews, focus groups, etc.)
- Funding to monitor health/environmental impacts with more accuracy
- ► Paperwork Reduction Act requires grantees to perform an ICR before asking survey-style questions. (ICR = Information Collection Request requiring several layers of approval and several months to complete)
- Others?
