Evaluation of EPA's Management of Resistance Issues Related to Herbicide Tolerant

Genetically Engineered Crops Project No. OPE-FY16-0023

The Office of Inspector General (OIG) for the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) plans to begin preliminary research to assess the EPA's management and oversight of resistance issues related to herbicide tolerant genetically engineered crops. Our review will include the Office of Pesticide Programs as well as other applicable headquarters and regional offices.

Our objectives are to determine:

- (1) What processes and practices, including alternatives, has the EPA provided to delay herbicide resistance?
- (2) What steps has the EPA taken to determine and validate the accurate risk to human health and the environment for approved pesticides to be used to combat herbicide resistant weeds?
- (3) Does the EPA independently collect and assess data on, and mitigate actual occurrences of, herbicide resistance in the field?

The OIG plans to conduct work at EPA headquarters and at any other applicable sites. Applicable generally accepted government auditing standards will be used to conduct our project. The anticipated benefit of this project is a greater understanding of herbicide resistance which will lead to an enhancement of EPA's herbicide resistance management and oversight.

We will contact you to arrange a mutually agreeable time to discuss our objectives and the purpose of the preliminary research phase of our project. We are also interested in any areas of concern that you may have. We will answer any of your questions about the project process, reporting procedures, methods used to gather and analyze data, and what we should expect of each other during the course of the project. Throughout the project, we will provide regular teleconference or videoconference updates to the point of contact designated by your office.

We respectfully note that the OIG is authorized by the Inspector General Act of 1978 to have timely access to personnel and all materials necessary to complete its objectives. We will request your resolution if an agency employee or contractor refuses to provide requested records to the OIG, or otherwise fails to cooperate with the OIG. We may report unresolved access matters to the Administrator and include the incident in our Semiannual Report to Congress.
