## Q&A

- **National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health:** Have you looked at this at all for use in health care situations?
  - **Mark Tucker:** There are studies right now for MRSA and other health-related pathogens. It is being used in some applications for that in health care facilities.
- **U.S. EPA:** When there is a wide-area, EPA and other government departments and agencies will be heavily involved, but sometimes it comes down to individual households. So, is this considered/envisioned for personal application?
  - Mark Tucker: It is not generally available to an average consumer. It is more for industrial applications. There are some small devices that first responders can use for a small-scale application. That is something that D7 will look at in the future, though. I should also say it was used during the avian flu outbreak in the Midwest in 2015 very successfully as well.
- National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health: What would you do with the foam after it is used?

**Mark Tucker:** It depends on the application. On a turkey farm, you do not have to do anything. It just dries to a very thin soap film. For a food contact surface, it is rinsed away. There are some very strict regulations on the amount of quats you can have on a food contact surface, so there is a requirement for rinsing afterwards
