He was not only a Zen Master, an activist, a mindfulness practitioner,

of Dr. Martin Luther King,

Thích Nhất Hạnh said many times in his teachings that calm as is anxiety is contagious.

88

So knowing that he tells a story that at the end of the Vietnam War

89

when the crowded refugee boats at the end of the war met up with storms or pirates

90

Vietnamese people escaping from a country that if they stayed in they would be killed,

91

00:06:03,199 --> 00:06:05,313

many died terrible

deaths in those boats,

92

00:06:05,337 --> 00:06:07,187

they were called boat people,

00:06:07,710 --> 00:06:14,160 and that dying was often fueled by the autopilot default mode of anxious panic,

94

00:06:14,160 --> 00:06:18,560 Thích Nhất Hạnh said "if everyone

panicked in that boat all was lost,

95

00:06:18,560 --> 00:06:19,958 people were gonna die."

96

He said if one person on the boat remained calm, it was enough to save everyone's life.

It showed the way for

everyone else to survive.

So I'd like to offer the metaphor of how we are as Matthew mentioned stakeholders

that has a goal dedicated to environmental justice and civil rights compliance.

We have made a number of

changes to that strategic plan

146

based upon the feedback

we received,

including the feedback we received from the

NEJAC following their January 5th meeting

just a few weeks ago, that's

actually one of the last pieces of work

149

that we have been doing the

last couple of weeks was working

150

00:10:19,345 --> 00:10:23,519

on those NEJAC comments

to the strategic plan.

So we're going to finalize that this week, pass it up to the administrator,

So as part of that, we were

required as all agencies

and departments were required to

produce a plan on advancing equity

176

throughout EPA's actions and

policies and programs by January 20th.

So we passed that action plan

up to the White House on January 20th.

178

The White House is looking at it now and is going to make those available very soon as well,

kind of in the same

manner of the strategic plans,

we can't share them

out, we share them up,

and then the White House

decides when to share them all out,

but they have shared with us that they

intend on making those public in early spring.

So I'm hopeful that a lot of the things

that we have put on paper as commitments

184

filter throughout everything we do at EPA,

is the implementation of the infrastructure resources appropriated by congress late last fall.

So a number of programs around EPA received a historic investment,

204

things like drinking water, waste water, cleaning up contaminated sites,

205

00:14:33,360 --> 00:14:37,519

getting old diesel engines out of communities,

206

00:14:37,519 --> 00:14:43,019

those all received what I think, I wish they weren't once in a generation investments,

207

00:14:43,043 --> 00:14:47,199

but they are, because they're really

big and they just don't happen very often.

208

00:14:47,199 --> 00:14:53,445

So we are working very, very

constantly, we're working all day long,

209

00:14:53,469 --> 00:14:57,440

and Lena's actually that's part

of the reason she joined us in OEJ.

210

Lena who just gave us the mindful

minute we brought her into OEJ

211

just to help us coordinate, working

on those infrastructure programs

with their colleagues out in the region

00:15:09,440 --> 00:15:12,399 coming up with an engagement plan overall,

00:15:12,399 --> 00:15:17,279 which again, we've been using these calls to engage on Justice40

00:15:17,279 --> 00:15:19,468 going forward, we'll probably use these

216

00:15:19,492 --> 00:15:22,746 and other channels to make sure we're engaging on our thinking

217

00:15:22,770 --> 00:15:24,792 around those infrastructure programs,

218

00:15:24,816 --> 00:15:30,000 what it means for Justice40 to try to make those things very transparent

219

and very accountable to the sorts of things that folks that you all at the community space

want and demand and need to see happen through the implementation of those resources,

So we're still waiting to see what happens in a revised Build Back Better,

228

00:16:14,812 --> 00:16:19,360

if that's what it is so called, once it gets revised,

229

00:16:19,360 --> 00:16:24,480

and then following whatever happens with

Build Back Better with the fiscal year 22 budget.

We of course are still on a continuing resolution across all the federal government

231

we don't have an

actual budget.

That continuing resolution

runs out in mid-February,

I think it's like the 18th

What's different about this new pot of money versus the old pot of money

So I think that's

a positive development.

So what's our vision now for the P2 grants.

a focus on environmental justice.

Both RFAs requests for applications

That's something that we've

have struggled with in recent years

572

00:41:44,355 --> 00:41:45,734

and getting those applications.

So we think this will certainly be able, this will reach out to those tribal communities

and get applications from the tribes.

We also are adding a new P2

program EJ focused mapping-tool

and working with entities to improve the access to safer chemicals for those individuals

602

So these two new grant programs that we are anticipating are our ongoing effort in FY 22

like cost of living.

650

00:47:42,286 --> 00:47:47,520 where you are, I think you still are, as it would in Omaha.

thought of that.

we saw that it affected Puerto Rico and their power and we were able to see how actually power

895

was disproportionately not turned on in the poorer areas as quickly as the richer areas.

896

You also can look at see surface site

information that we collect from our satellites,

897

combine that with demographic data and look at the impacts of sea level rise

898

on people who live along the coast including underserved communities.

Or maybe you're interested in understanding water

and we've worked with the Navajo nation to look at their water resource limitations

And so what this particular project just found is that, in fact, the hurricane Harvey

941

01:07:18,352 --> 01:07:23,280 was affecting everyone and in fact, the flooding was affecting everyone

In fact, they saw that sometimes the higher were more affected.

944

And then you can also see-- they saw some positive correlation between elderly

945

exposed to flooding.

That's what we measure,

we measure that column,

Matthew Tejada: I wholeheartedly agree and I'm gonna take credit for--

I actually wrote specifically into our strategic plan a commitment that the EPA will establish--

1160

I can't remember what word I use, the financial vehicle or whatever else to do exactly that.

1161

I think not only is it wrong, it might not be completely in compliance with requirements

1162

that we don't pay people for the time when we ask them for things.

1163

We certainly don't ask scientists outside of the federal government

1164

01:21:52,132 --> 01:21:57,440

to do science for us for free and we don't ask lawyers to do lawyering for us for free

1165

and we don't ask engineers to do engineering for us for free.

1166

We should not ask community leaders and community members to give us their time

1167

01:22:06,631 --> 01:22:11,440

and input and knowledge to help us figure out what we're doing to help us

1168

01:22:11,440 --> 01:22:18,239

implement our programs to help us advance our policies without compensating them for that.

1169

That's different from holding a public hearing that's open to everyone

01:22:22,399 --> 01:22:24,919

and trying to get

broad community input.

1171

It's when we're sitting

down with folks saying

1172

01:22:27,232 --> 01:22:31,120

"Okay, who can we engage with?

What is the issue we need to look out for?"

1173

That's us relying on their expertise and we should absolutely compensate them

1174

01:22:38,152 --> 01:22:41,852

giving us their expertise, we should

be paying them for that.

1175

We don't have a way

of doing that at present,

1176

so we're gonna have to figure something out but I agree and I've committed the agency

1177

and it's one of those that I'm hoping and intend on making progress with very quickly

known me for a long time

have a heart defect that I was born with.

Jane Williams: That heart defect

is directly linked to PM 2.5 exposure.

1197

And the next question you should be

asking me is, how do I know that?

1198

01:24:14,480 --> 01:24:20,960

And how I know that

is because of NASA's satellites.

01:24:20,960 --> 01:24:26,388

Now, if I lived in the European Union I would have known that a long time ago

1200

01:24:26,412 --> 01:24:32,560

because the European Union has an integrated modernized air pollution monitoring program

1201

01:24:32,560 --> 01:24:39,040

that integrates fence line monitoring, regional monitoring and satellites.

1202

01:24:39,040 --> 01:24:43,931

We are in a unique opportunity to do this exact same thing here in the United States

1203

01:24:43,955 --> 01:24:50,480

and modernize and update our

air pollution monitoring networks,

1204

01:24:50,480 --> 01:24:55,440

and that requires one

critical thing that is missing.

And that is when we go out and we spend the 20 million dollars

1206

that we fought to get on monitoring,

1207

we cannot throw money out the door for anything that is not federal reference method

1208

federal yes-- or

federal equivalent methods.

Now, environmental justice

communities calls for air monitoring

1210

01:25:18,451 --> 01:25:25,440

have resulted so far in one

giant thing that I see, con men.

1211

Showing up environmental justice communities with some black box

1212

01:25:29,032 --> 01:25:32,000

saying "Give us money

and we'll monitor your air."

1213

Matthew Tejada: We'll solve all

your problems with this little device

1214

01:25:34,798 --> 01:25:36,521

that nobody thought of before.

1215

01:25:36,545 --> 01:25:40,480

Jane Williams: Exactly, now I was on

the webinar for the monitoring program

1216

01:25:40,480 --> 01:25:45,360

and I asked the question directly to OAQPS and ORD staff.

1217

01:25:45,360 --> 01:25:49,366

"As you guys toss this money out the door, are you guys part of the con

1218

01:25:49,390 --> 01:25:51,920

or are you part of being real?"

1219

01:25:51,920 --> 01:25:55,679

And I did not get an answer.

1220

01:25:55,679 --> 01:25:59,520

So we need to make sure that any monitoring that we're doing

1221

01:25:59,520 --> 01:26:07,199

will actually be actionable and inform the agency's decisions and actions

1222

01:26:07,199 --> 01:26:10,690

whether it's on a regulation, whether it's on enforcement,

1223

01:26:10,714 --> 01:26:13,244 whether it's on changing containment status,

1224

01:26:13,268 --> 01:26:17,600 and if it's not, then really that's part of the con.

1225

01:26:19,040 --> 01:26:24,880 Now I had a guy who was the retired director of the USDA laboratory

1226

01:26:24,880 --> 01:26:29,040 who could not figure out how to use NASA's PM 2.5 data.

1227

01:26:29,040 --> 01:26:35,040 So NASA has equally a part here, they've got to make their data usable

01:26:35,040 --> 01:26:38,159

by more people than just their insiders.

1229

01:26:38,159 --> 01:26:42,880

And so I know they're on the phone

because I gave a webinar to them-- for them

1230

01:26:42,880 --> 01:26:48,268

on this issue and I talked about how vital

we have two new satellites being launched,

1231

01:26:48,292 --> 01:26:53,588

Tempo and Maya and we need to

be prepared to use that data

1232

01:26:53,612 --> 01:26:58,608

and to make that data usable

by decision makers at EPA

1233

01:26:58,632 --> 01:27:03,908

and in the states and in the nonprofit NGO

movement and in our environmental justice movement.

So we've got to find a way

to modernize and integrate

1235

all this air pollution

monitoring that we're doing.

PM 2.5 at a four kilometer grid.

1237

Tempo will be geostationary,

it will hover over our country

1238

01:27:24,052 --> 01:27:30,627

and it will be able to read out at a very small grid level for a number of the criteria pollutants,

1239

01:27:30,651 --> 01:27:35,748

but right now EPA is not ready to use that data and this is critical for us to get at,

1240

01:27:35,772 --> 01:27:39,068

we cannot say that we care about environmental justice communities

1241

01:27:39,092 --> 01:27:42,047

when we have millions of

dollars of satellites in the sky

1242

01:27:42,071 --> 01:27:43,199

that can tell us what's in our air

1243

01:27:43,199 --> 01:27:47,280

but we can't translate that data to the very communities who most need it.

1244

Thank you so much.

Matthew Tejada: Thanks, Jane.

1246

Thanks for sharing that

too, especially in this forum.

We do have-- one of the areas that I have

not been as involved in as of the others

Those are of course very on point and things that we're working towards.
