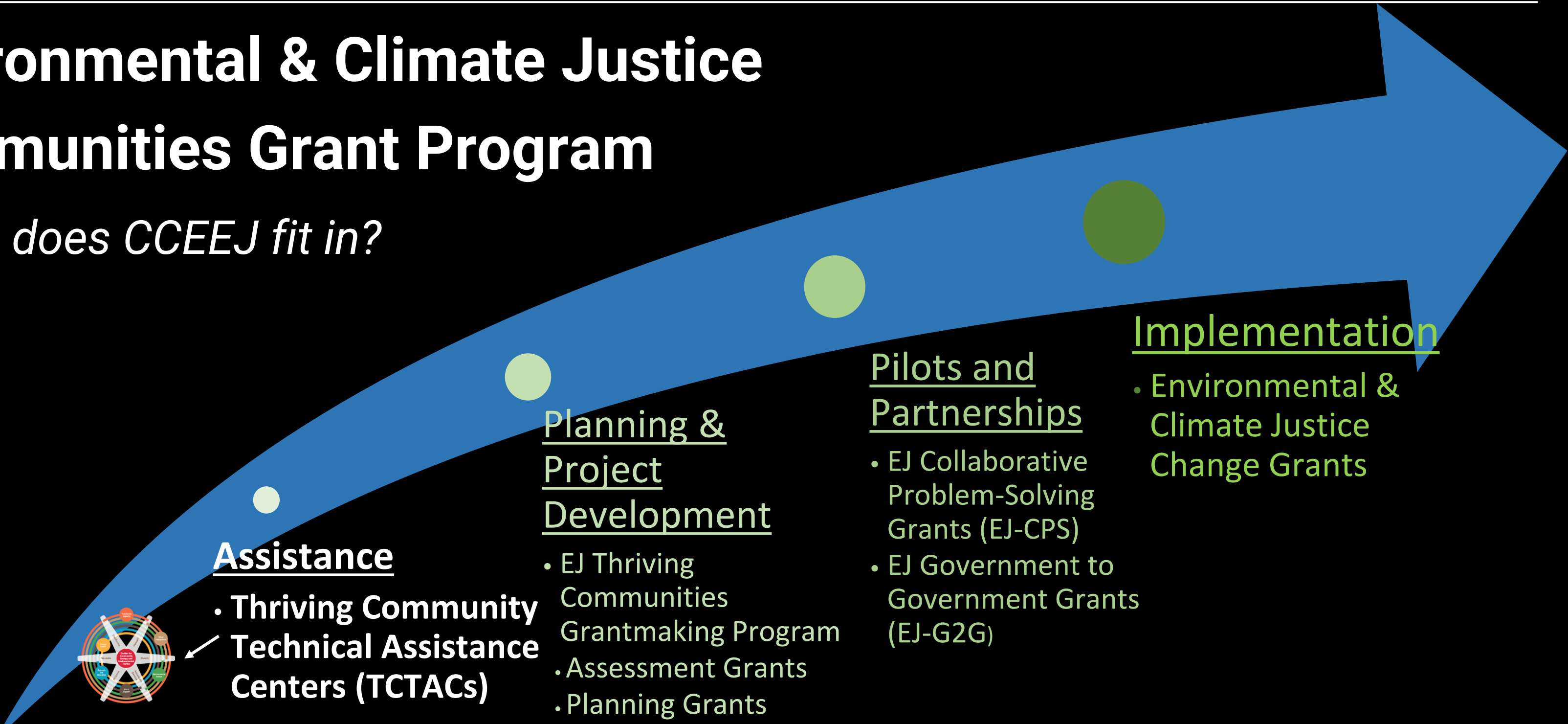

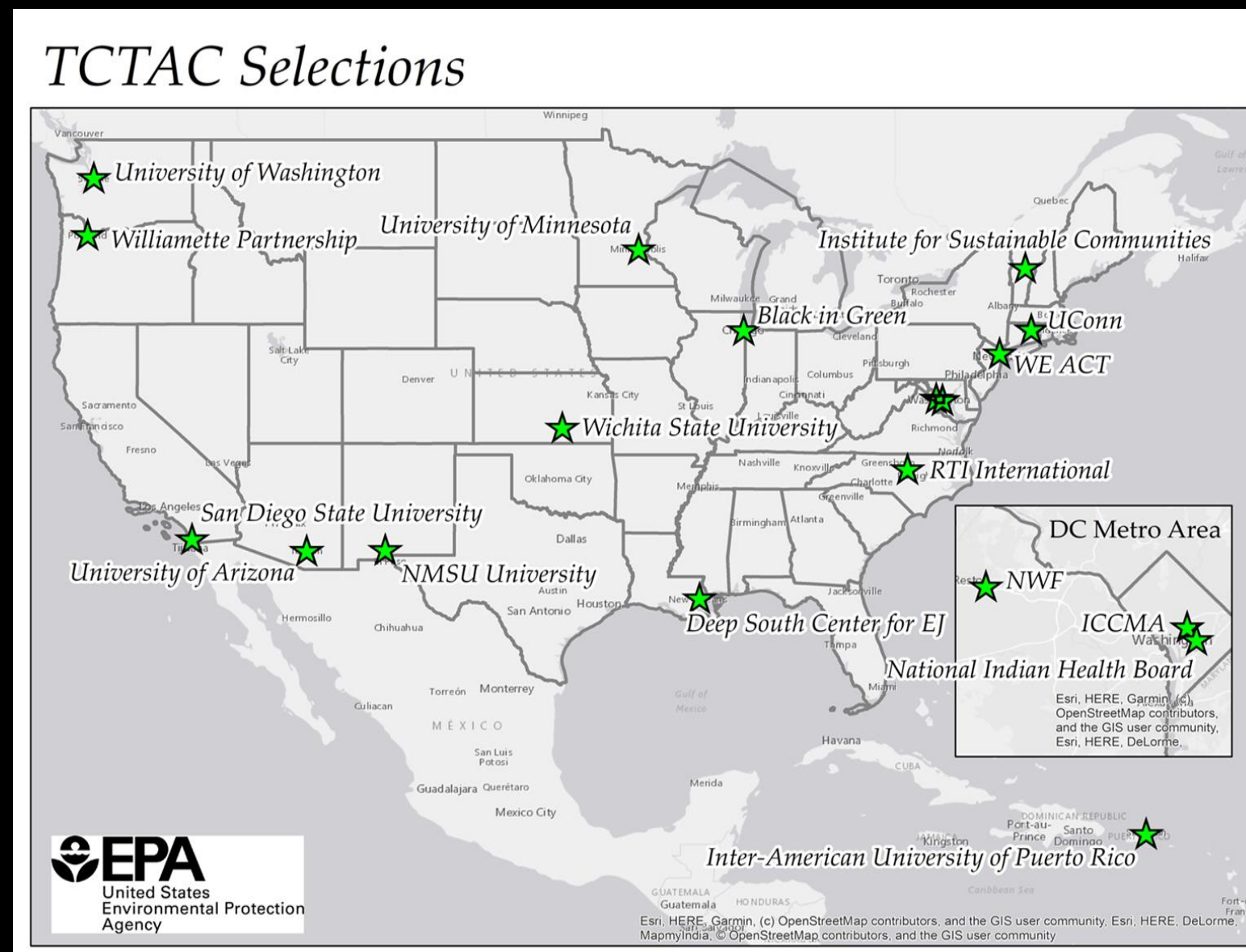
Where does CCEEJ fit in?





Thriving Communities Technical Assistance Centers (TCTACs)

- **\$177 million nationwide**
 - Each TCTAC received at least \$10 million funded incrementally
 - 5-year project period
 - Inter-agency and Intra-agency partner - Department of Energy (DOE)
- **Regional EJ TCTACs**
 - Provide direct TA to communities in assigned EPA regions/geographic area(s)
- **National EJ TCTACs**
 - Will coordinate with the Regional EJ TCTACs, fill gaps in coverage, develop national databases, host TA summits, etc.
 - National EJ TCTAC devoted specifically to addressing the needs of tribal communities

Examples of Technical Assistance

Examples of Technical Assistance

Tribal and Indigenous

- Identifying tribal-specific grant opportunities
- Trainings and workshops geared towards tribal and indigenous communities, particularly around environmental health
- Professional and leadership development
- Environmental justice/energy justice assessments, **and more!**

Energy

- Energy policy and law expertise
- 1:1 advising
- Trainings and workshops: Intro to Energy Justice, EnJ tools, DOE community benefits plans, federal/state strategies



What community organizations are eligible for technical assistance ?

- non-profit organizations
- community-based/grassroots organizations
- philanthropic and civic organizations
- underserved communities and organizations
- rural and remote communities and organizations
- faith-based organizations and churches
- educational institutions
- disadvantaged businesses
- local and state governments
- Tribal nations and other tribal organizations, communities
- US Territories
- Utility and healthcare providers and clinics



Case Study Example

Organization XYZ is a Tribal organization located in Southern California. In their community, there are 2 old, abandoned gas stations that they want to clean up and re-develop into a recreational green space for their community

They are unsure where to start with this project. They have some experience with writing grants and have been awarded grants before for other projects. They are unsure what kinds of funding opportunities they should be looking for to support this project.





Case Study Example

Organization XYZ has the option to request **free** technical assistance from CCEEJ

- Tribal organization
- Environmental justice focused project (brownfields/land re-use project)
- Unsure of where to even start

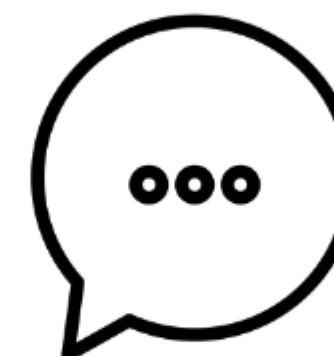

How to Request Technical Assistance

Step 2: Filling out our form

- Contact information
- Information on the organization
- Assessing environmental/energy justice concerns and assistance needs
- Barriers in addressing these concerns
- Preferred method of contact

Questions are **not required**. You can simply fill out contact and organization information

Case Study Example

Organization XYZ chooses to fill out the CCEEJ technical assistance request form on their website.

Rather than filling out the entire form, Organization XYZ fills out their name, email, organization name, and the name of their Tribal nation. They would prefer to discuss the rest of the information over the intake meeting call.

They submit their form and wait to hear back from a CCEEJ team member.



Intake Meeting

Step 3: Scheduling your 1:1 Intake

- After you have submitted your technical assistance request via the three methods, a CCEEJ team member will reach out to you to schedule a 1:1 intake call.
- These are 30 minute virtual calls that can be held on Zoom, Google Meet, Microsoft Teams, or phone call. The purpose of these intake calls is to:
 - Learn more about your organization
 - Understand the environmental/energy justice challenges and priorities that the community you serve is facing
 - Understand assistance needs
 - Assess grant readiness





Case Study Example

- Organization XYZ schedules a Zoom call with CCEEJ and provides information on their organization and their needs.
- Information collected from Organization XYZ
 - Tribal organization located in Southern California
 - Needs assistance with brownfields and land re-use. Specifically two abandoned gas stations that they want to re-develop into recreational green space
 - Has applied to smaller grants before and has been awarded some. Is interested in applying for federal funding, but is unsure if they have registered for SAM.gov or grants.gov
 - Would like help identifying funding opportunities relevant to this project



Receiving your Technical Assistance Plan

Step 4: Reviewing Intake Notes

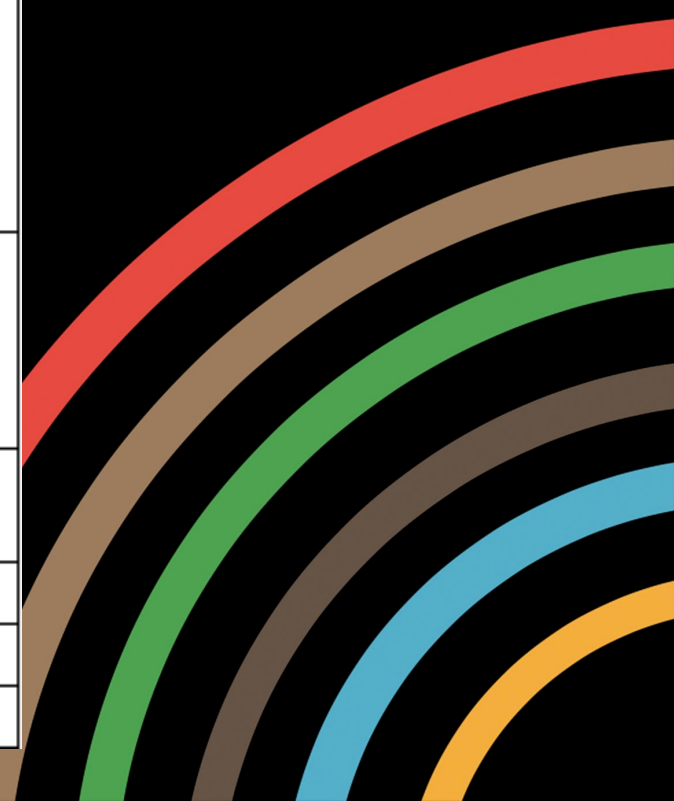
- The CCEEJ grants administration and leadership team meets on a weekly basis to review any standing intake meeting notes from TA requests
- We discuss what grant support services we can offer and which subteams would best fit the organization's technical assistance needs.

Step 5: Sending the TA plan

- After coming to an agreement, we then send a technical assistance plan via email, phone call, text, etc. for your organization's review and approval
- We then will connect you to our subteam lead, if applicable. Tribal organizations are automatically referred to our Tribal and Indigenous team

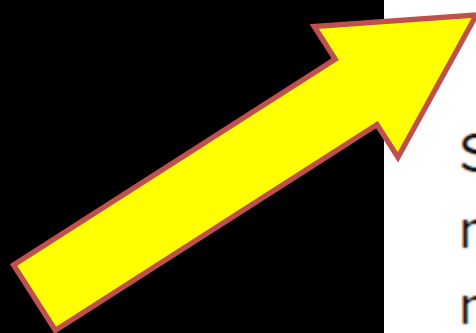

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Grant Writing Training Opportunities

(projected early 2024)

Live Training

- 6-8 week intensive training using Writing for Green content (hosted over Zoom)
- Participation stipend available (amount TBD)
- Sessions include individual and small group work, hands-on exercises, and peer-to-peer feedback

Guided Training

- Hosted on Writing for Green's learning management system
- Access to content from live training curriculum through video lessons (~45 minutes each)
- Learn at your own pace
- Access to coaches who can provide feedback on writing exercises

Webinars/Office Hours

- CCEEJ hosted webinars on specific grant-writing topics using Writing for Green curriculum (hosted over Zoom)
