David Widawsky is the Director of EPA's Office of the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund, a historic \$27 billion investment in financing the clean energy transformation, especially for communities that need it most. He has worked at the U.S. EPA since 1998, where he has served in a number of leadership roles in EPA's Office of the Administrator, Office of Pollution Prevention and Toxics, Office of the Chief Financial Officer, and Office of



Pesticide Programs. David received undergraduate degrees from the University of California, Berkeley; his Master's degree from Colorado State University; and earned his Ph.D. in Applied Economics at Stanford University. Prior to joining EPA, he lived and worked in the Philippines, China, India, the Netherlands, and Scotland.

Ashley Allen Jones

Senior Finance Advisor

U.S. EPA Office of the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund

Ashley Allen Jones leads environmental finance innovation across the water, agriculture, and energy sectors. She recently joined the Environmental Protection Agency's Office of the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund as Senior Finance Advisor, where supports implementation of the National Clean Investment Fund and Clean Community Investment Accelerators with an eye toward maximum leverage of private capital. She also serves as Chief

Executive Officer of i2 Capital, a firm she founded to expand private investment and public-private partnerships in the sustainability realm. In 2019, Ashley became the founding Board Chair of the Conservation Innovation Fund, a blended finance fund formed to expand market-based solutions for water, carbon and biodiversity through driving capital and execution across an integrated value chain of activities. The CIF has received over \$30mn in financial backing from public and private sources, including grants, loans, and in-kind financial commitments. Recently CIF closed the first major contract awarded under Maryland's landmark Clean Water Commerce Act, an outcomes based model for watershed conservation in the Chesapeake Bay watershed.

In 2020, Ashley joined EPA's Environmental Financial Advisory Board, where she has co-chaired working groups that advise the Administrator and Staff on the \$27bn Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund and the



agency's Pollution Prevention program. She holds several private company board positions, and has served on the Boards of the Shakespeare Theatre Company and Washington Area Women's Foundation. Before founding i2 Capital, Ashley spent two decades in the transactional finance sector – as an investor, investment banker and advisor – where she directed over \$1bn for social and environmental projects, managed venture capital investments primarily in technology companies, and helped to execute over \$1bn in Mergers & Acquisitions and private equity deals in the global Aerospace & Defense sector. Raised in rural Wyoming, Ashley has a deep reverence for nature, alongside farming, ranching and watershed scale conservation and supply chain sustainability.

She recently completed a policy fellowship at the Aspen Institute Climate Technology & Policy Program and advises on NYC Offshore Wind Community Fund, designed to build an offshore wind industry that benefits historically underserved communities. Lorry Frigerio has been with the EPA Office of Environmental Justice and External Civil Rights (OEJECR) for almost 2 years, helping to lead technical assistance efforts funded by the Inflation Reduction Act under the Community Change Technical Assistance (CCTA) Program in support of the \$2B Community Change Grants. Lorry has been with EPA for the last 35 years where she has gained valuable experience with numerous program offices, intra-/interagency and intergovernmental collaboration, multi-stakeholder processes, and various community-focused efforts. She started her career in

the Region 2 Superfund program as a Remedial Project Manager. Upon completing the Greater Leadership Opportunities Program, she joined the international office in HQ to work on the U.S.-Mexico border program and implementation of the NAFTA environmental side agreement with U.S. and Mexico. She also served as the Designated Federal Officer on the NEJAC International Subcommittee. Lorry continued her NAFTA work in the Office of Pesticides Programs to foster pesticides regulatory





harmonization and supported other pesticides efforts including Schools Integrated Pest Management and Tribal activities such as bed bug management. Lorry also spent some time in the Office of Policy, first as a Special Assistant working mostly on climate adaptation and then as Acting Director for the Federal and State Division of the Office of Sustainable Communities where she contributed to Smart Growth efforts and the Making A Visible Difference in Communities initiative. Later, she joined the Office of Enforcement and Compliance Assurance where she helped launch OECA's reporting under EPA's Lean Management System and also led efforts to improve reporting of environmental benefits resulting from EPA enforcement actions, including development of a new policy on GHG reporting. Under a Skills Marketplace workshare, Lorry also developed a new Best Practices for Community Involvement to Strengthen EJ at Federal Facility NPL Sites. Lorry holds a B.S. in Chemical Engineering from Columbia University. She is fluent in Spanish and was raised with strong cultural ties to her family in Chile.

Megan V. Brachtl

Air Quality Policy Division Associate Director U.S. EPA Office of Air Quality Planning and Standards

Megan V. Brachtl is an Associate Director for the Air Quality Policy Division (AQPD) in the Office of Air Quality Planning and Standards at U.S. EPA. Currently she leads the Climate Pollution Reduction Grants program authorized under the 2022 Inflation Reduction Act, but she also provides strategic leadership for EPA's National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS) implementation efforts, New Source Review (NSR) permitting, and permitting for projects on the Outer Continental Shelf (OCS). Between 2014

and 2021, Ms. Brachtl served as supervisor for both the NAAQS implementation group and NSR/OCS permitting group within AQPD. Her other roles since joining EPA in 2005 include environmental engineer in the Office of Transportation and Air Quality, where she helped develop regulations for EPA's Renewable Fuel Standard (RFS) Program and the Greenhouse Gas Reporting Program (GHGRP).

Ms. Brachtl is a Returned Peace Corps Volunteer (Côte d'Ivoire, 1998-2000). She holds master's degrees from the School of Engineering and The Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy at Tufts University (Medford, MA), and a BS in civil engineering from Northeastern University (Boston, MA). This August she will graduate with an MBA from Boston University.

Tim Profeta

Panel Moderator Senior Fellow Nicholas Institute at Duke University

Tim Profeta is a senior fellow at Duke University's Nicholas Institute for Energy, Environment & Sustainability and associate professor of the practice at Duke's Sanford School of Public Policy.

In 2023, Profeta returned to Duke from two years of service at the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, where he served as the special counsel for the power sector and a senior advisor. At the Agency, Profeta had a lead



role in the development of the regulatory strategy affecting the power sector, including the recent proposed greenhouse gas regulations, served as a liaison between the Agency and other federal departments and agencies regarding power sector policies, and took an instrumental role in the design of several Agency programs that were authorized in the 2022 Inflation Reduction Act.

Prior to leaving for EPA, Profeta was the founding director of the Nicholas Institute for Environmental Policy Solutions, which merged with the Duke University Energy Initiative in 2021 to create the Nicholas Institute for Energy, Environment & Sustainability. Since its creation in 2005, the Nicholas Institute has grown into a major nonpartisan player in key environmental debates, serving both the public and private sectors with sound understanding of complex environmental issues.

Profeta's areas of expertise include climate change and energy policy, the Clean Air Act, and adaptive use of current environmental laws to address evolving environmental challenges. His work at the Nicholas Institute has included numerous legislative and executive branch proposals to mitigate climate change, including providing Congressional testimony several times on his work at Duke University, developing multiple legislative proposals for cost containment and economic efficiency in greenhouse gas mitigation programs, and facilitating climate and energy policy design processes for several U.S. states.

Prior to his arrival at Duke, Profeta served as counsel for the environment to Sen. Joseph Lieberman. As Lieberman's counsel, he was a principal architect of the Lieberman-McCain Climate Stewardship Act of 2003. He also represented Lieberman in legislative negotiations pertaining to environmental and energy issues, as well as coordinating the senator's energy and environmental portfolio during his runs for national office. Profeta has continued to build on his Washington experience to engage in the most pertinent debates surrounding climate change and energy.

Profeta is a member of the Climate Action Reserve Board of Directors, and is a member of The American Law Institute.

Profeta earned a J.D., magna cum laude, and a master's in environmental management in resource ecology from Duke in 1997 and a Bachelor's degree in political science from Yale University in 1992.

Dale S. Bryk

State & Regional Policy Director Harvard Environmental & Energy Law Program

Dale Bryk is Director of State & Regional Policy at the Harvard Environmental & Energy Law Program and a Senior Fellow at the Regional Plan Association. She helped launch the Conveners Network, which supports state efforts to develop climate and clean energy strategies and access and deploy federal resources to advance them. She served as New York State's Deputy Secretary for Energy and Environment from 2019-2020. As the Governor's top energy and environment policy advisor, she oversaw New York's nation-leading climate agenda and directed the agencies and authorities responsible for developing and implementing the state policies and initiatives needed to build a just and sustainable clean energy economy, including the landmark Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act.



Prior to this role, Dale was the Director of Programs at the Natural Resources Defense Council. Throughout her 21 years at NRDC, she worked to develop and implement climate, energy efficiency, renewable energy and clean transportation policies. From 2002 to 2010, she also taught the Environmental Law Clinic at Yale Law School. Before joining NRDC, she practiced corporate law at Davis Polk & Wardwell in New York. Dale holds a bachelor's degree from Colgate University, a master's from the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy at Tufts University, and a J.D. from Harvard Law School. She is based in New York City.

Adam Kent

Adam Kent works to maximize the catalytic impact public and private capital can play in shifting the financial system to deliver a sustainable, resilient, just, and equitable economy. Prior to NRDC, Kent was the deputy director in the Washington, D.C., office of the Local Initiatives Support Corporation (LISC). During his time there, he financed over 1,500 affordable homes for lower-income families and helped to grow LISC's solar financing. In addition,



he developed and led LISC's Elevating Equity Initiative, a \$100 million effort devoted to fostering equitable and inclusive development in the neighborhoods surrounding the 11th Street Bridge Park. Prior to LISC, Kent worked as a high school math teacher in the D.C. public schools system and as a researcher at the Urban Institute. He serves on the board of Project Create, a D.C.-based arts nonprofit that delivers accessible multidisciplinary arts education and programming to youth and families. The loss of her home moved Daphany to fight for climate resiliency in the communities she grew up with, organizing neighborhoods of color across every major borough in the city while working alongside renewable energy companies and climate resiliency organizations to provide these community members with the tools they need to reduce their energy bills, reduce their carbon footprints, and keep their homes protected from natural disasters.

She is a graduate of NYU Tandon School of Engineering and holds a Master's of Science in Environmental Policy and Sustainability Management from the New School.
